


#### Registration in Indiana

#### Goals:


- 1. Single place for victims to register and receive notifications (VNS).
- 2. Central location to place jail census information for data queries with standardized data (Data Transformation Solution DTS).

Partnership between CJI, ISA, and DOC

- DOC owns registry

## Setting the stage

- Definitions / Abbreviations
  - Addiction Recovery Services (ARS)
  - Mental Health (MH)
  - Co-Ocurring
  - Behavioral Health (BH)

- National Prisons Averages
  - 37% of population has MH needs.
  - 65% with ARS needs.
- Indiana Jails
  - 22% in MH treatment
  - 27% in ARS
- Indiana
  - 26% in BH treatment (co-occurring included)
  - 19 % in ARS

## Data Challenges

- ARS change from "program" to treatment.
- Need does not equal diagnosis.
- Completed and/or refused treatment.
- Use of tablet-based or informal services.
- Threshold limitations.
- Individual barriers.

## Addiction Recovery Recovery While Incarcerated (RWI)

#### **Foundations**

- Independent Study
- Education, resources, information.
- Prior to group treatment, those with limited needs, refuse group treatment or in housing the restricts them from group treatment.

#### Residential

- 10-15% begin here.
- 30 days +/-
- Recovery Oriented Community
- 20+ hours group treatment 5+ days a week

#### Intensive

- 20-25% begin here.
- 90 days +/-
- 6+ hours group treatment, over 2 or more days.

#### Outpatient

- 60-70% begin here.
- 90 days +/-
- 1 hour of group treatment per week.
- Encouraged to participate in other activities/jobs

#### Aftercare

 Those desiring ongoing relapse prevention support



# Challenges for treating people in IDOC

- Programs Z Treatment Z Easy Fix
- Effectiveness of treatment depends on incarcerated individual's willingness to change
- Vacancies (Medical and IDOC)
  - Public Service Loan Forgiveness Ineligibility
  - Lack of diversity in staffing
- Increased BH needs/medications upon entry into IDOC
- Incarcerated Individuals with a functional impairment
- Aging Population
- Aging Facilities
- Juvenile Justice

## Plans to Improve Treatment Delivery

- Group Treatment/Peer Movement
- Grants
  - Indiana Criminal Justice Institute
  - Department of Mental Health and Addiction
  - Opioid Settlement Money
- Outpatient Commitments
- Physical Plant changes/upgrades
- New Facility Build



#### Best Practices and Barriers

- Community Care when possible.
- Evidence Based Treatment (EBT).
- Using data to inform our decisions.
- Effective training for all staff.
- Continuity of Care.
  - Transitional Health Services
  - Outpatient Commitments
- Continuum of Services.
- Addressing Social Determinants of Health.
